ALSTON & BIRD CPSC RECALL SNAPSHOT A MONTHLY REVIEW OF CONSUMER PRODUCT RECALLS AND CIVIL PENALTIES ANNOUNCED BY THE CPSC

December 2019

Welcome to the December edition of the Alston & Bird CPSC Recall Snapshot.

The CPSC has come under scrutiny this year by some who feel it did not appropriately handle complaints about certain consumer products, prompting an investigation into its actions by the Senate. After the *Washington Post* published an article about the CPSC's handling of reports of injuries from BOB jogging strollers earlier this year, U.S. Senator Maria Cantwell (D-WA), the ranking member of the Senate Commerce, Science, and Transportation Committee, demanded the CPSC produce documents related to its investigation into the strollers. Her <u>April 8, 2019 letter</u> (which was supplemented by a June 27, 2019 letter) initiated an inquiry into the CPSC's handling of its investigation into the strollers, Fisher-Price Rock 'N Play Sleepers, and residential elevators.

Last week, the Senate Commerce Committee issued a <u>report</u> (associated exhibits can be found <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>) after reviewing the documents it received in response to the Senator's requests, finding that a "series of high-profile failures to effectively recall dangerous products" occurred as a "result of a pattern of inappropriate deference to industry that has characterized CPSC leadership in recent years." The report criticizes, among other things, the CPSC's approval of settlements allowing companies to offer coupons toward the purchase of additional products rather than offering refunds to consumers, describing that the recalls "perversely serve as marketing tools" that function "less as true remedies for consumers, and more as incentive programs to bring more business to the companies involved in the recalls."

The report's ultimate recommendations are for the CPSC to (1) increase the use of imminent health and safety warnings; (2) "more aggressively" use its penalty authority when companies fail to timely report a substantial product hazard; and (3) use refunds or "consumer-friendly" repairs as a default remedy rather than utilizing coupons or voucher programs.

The CPSC has not issued a public response to the report as of yet, but the report does note that the "CPSC has expressed an indication to take a more aggressive approach to protecting consumers and addressing past failures." The majority of the CPSC's actions investigated by the committee occurred under the leadership of then-CPSC Acting Chairman Anne Marie Buerkle, a Republican, who recently stepped down from her position as acting chairman. She was succeeded by the current acting chairman, Commissioner Bob Adler, a Democrat.
